## MANAGEMENT AND INFRASTRUCTURE

- The reserve's office buildings have been improved (plastering, installation of doors, sanitary facilities, etc.). • A new office location has been identified in capital, N'Djamena.
- LAW ENFORCEMENT

#### • 17 patrols were carried out in September, totalling 409 men/days for 1,605 km covered. • 13 herders and 3 poachers were arrested during the patrols, 15 fines were issued, 1 warning was given. • 59 edge weapons were seized, 10 illegal camps were dismantled.

· 3 poachers were brought to justice. · Security conditions were reinforced for motorcycle patrols (helmets, insurance, etc.) and for officers (uniforms, shoes, GPS, ammunition, etc.).

### TONKOUATI-DOULI NATIONAL PARK MANAGEMENT AND INFRASTRUCTURE

• The management team (park director, deputy park director, programme assistant) met with a contractor in Conkouati to assess the existing buildings and determine what renovations would be needed for the future Head Quarters. • A second-hand boat engine was purchased to be adapted to an existing boat, ensuring surveillance using the many rivers of the park. • 2 turtle monitoring camps were rehabilitated by the NGO Renatura.

## LAW ENFORCEMENT

- The fixed patrol posts in Youbi and Yanika were manned by 12 ecoguards contributing to: 1. Intervention in cases of human/elephant conflict
- 2. Integration of sniffer dogs in surveillance activities for 3 days 3. Seizure of poached wildlife (13 duikers, 2 monkeys, 7 porcupines)


#### • A first mission was organized to test the solar drone in the field, and to train the users. This drone, capable of flying continuously as long as there is sunshine (of which the region is undeniably very endowed), will allow filming areas in detail. This surveillance will improve the knowledge of the terrain, including its wildlife and will facilitate the ecological mapping of the reserve.

## **COMMUNITIES DEVELOPMENT** • It's time to go back to school in Niger. The students on vacation with their

#### families in the reserve have been transported by our teams to the boarding school in Zinder, where they will be accommodated for the entire school year, with financial support from the reserve. • The rehabilitation of the Dongoumi and Kaltouma wells is still in progress. A follow-up mission was organized to evaluate the progress and quality of the work done by the company of the Hydraulic Office of the Tesker department. The work is advancing according to plan.


What is your day-to-day work? My daily life in the reserve is focused on anti-poaching work! Each of us has the opportunity to be team leader during the patrols, because we take turns in leading the patrols, so that each of us learns how to conduct a mission.

What is your favorite animal on the reserve? The Addax nasomaculatus, because it is the last of these species living in the wild in the whole world. I am very sensitive to the fact that it is in danger of extinction,

because it is a world heritage with a biological uniqueness. Do you have a significant story to tell about your work? The story I'm about to tell is funny! When we were little, we played soccer, and

there was a child of a forestry officer who was made fun of. We used to tell him that his father prevented the farmers from cutting down trees and killing gazelles, even though God had created them for us. To my great surprise, fate wanted me to become a forestry officer! Today, my greatest wish is that everyone becomes aware of the need to better protect our national heritage.
