LAW ENFORCEMENT

• 43 new Forestry agents were made available to Parcs de Noé by the Ministry of the Environment, Urban Health and Sustainable Development, who took up their duties on December 20st. • A total of 350 man-days of patrols were carried out, in close collaboration with the Regional Directorate of the Environment in Zinder and the Departmental Directorates of Tesker and Tânout.

BIODIVERSITY CONSERVATION

• Three employees of the Termit & Tin Toumma were trained by African Parks in the "W" National Park in Benin on the preparation of a longterm strategy for the sustainable management of a protected area, as the basis for the development of a management plan.



THE ARABIAN BUSTARD

The Arabian Bustard (Ardeotis arabs) is a species of bird belonging to the Otididae family. As with all bustards, the male Arabian bustard is much larger (5.7 to 10.9 kg) than the female (4.5 to 7.7 kg). It has a more graceful and elegant appearance compared to other species of their genus, with a more refined spotting on the wing. This bird lives throughout the Sahel, South Sudan and the southern





It is therefore present in and around the Termit and Tin-Toumma Nature Reserve. In 2012, the species was classified by the IUCN as "Near Threatened" because of a sharp decline in its population. The main cause seems to be strong hunting pressure, with degradation and destruction of its habitat also playing

a major role.

LAW ENFORCEMENT

- The anti-poaching training began on December 14 after a first week of testing and evaluations. During 6 weeks, the LAB expert trains 15 Wildlife and Forest Protection (GFF) officers on law enforcement tactics and the elephant protection strategy. A second training will follow, to train the
- second group of agents. A first routine patrol during the training already allowed to meet elephants, numerous warthogs and gazelles. Tracks of monkeys were also found. Individual surveillance equipment (tents, backpacks, etc.) for the GFF agents to conduct ground patrols arrived in Binder and were distributed to


BIODIVERSITY CONSERVATION

- Wildlife monitoring within the reserve by camera-trap was initiated through the aerial identification of the best sites for the installation of cameras. In parallel, 5 camera-traps are being experimented in order to refine the methodology.
- The operation of collaring 4 elephants within the reserve continued this month with the delivery of the necessary equipment including collars, the anaesthesia gun and air-ground communication equipment. • 20 hours of aerial overflights were conducted throughout the reserve to locate the elephant herd towards the northern border, to find a group of 15 roan antelopes and a fishing camp at Gauthiot Falls. No cattle or nomadic camps were observed.

CONKOUATI-DOULI NATIONAL PARK

• A mission to Brazzaville was organised end of December to finalize the joint drafting of the Partnership Agreement for the management of the Conkouati-Douli National Park (PNCD), with the government of Congo.

FOCUS ON A TEAM MEMBER



Edouard Boulanodji is Parcs de Noé's Country Representative in Chad and Chadian by birth. After his university studies in natural sciences and forest ecology, he worked for the Ministry of Environment, the Zakouma National Park, UNDP and an NGO working in the Manda National Park. In 2017 he met Noé and was hired as Coordinator for the Project for Support for the Sustainable Management of Sahelo-Saharan Protected Areas Niger-Chad (PAGAPS).

Edouard has a real expertise in the creation of national parks in Chad: "When I worked for the inventory and mapping department of the Ministry of Environment, I participated in the creation of the Sena Oura National Park. This experience

proved invaluable in setting up the future Zah Soo National Park in Binder-Léré. So how far along is this Zah Soo National Park project?

"The process is on track and the communities living there are 100% committed to the project. They expect multiple benefits, such as employment - we already employ a few drivers and guards - income generating activities, infrastructure such as boreholes, schools and health centers, mechanisms to regulate human-wildlife conflicts (especially with regard to elephants, feared by farmers), and in the long term tourism development.
